

APPENDIX

The following ordinances and resolutions are no longer of general interest, mainly because their provisions were carried out directly after their enactment. Since they are mainly of historical or special interest, it has not been considered necessary to include their entire text here. Instead, they have been arranged by groups, according to subject matter, and with each group all enactments are listed by title, in chronological order. The context of the ordinances and resolutions is indexed, in all necessary detail, in the general index at the end of this volume. Persons desiring to read the full text of any of these enactments may do so by consulting the original ordinance books in the custody of the Township Secretary.

I. AGREEMENTS AND CONTRACTS

1-1. Approving and authorizing a 1963 Lease Termination Agreement between the Township of Spring and the Municipal Authority of Spring as of July 1, 1989. Also, approving and authorizing a 1966 Lease Termination Agreement between the Township of Spring and the Municipal Authority of Spring with respect to sewers. (Ordinance 204, June 26, 1989)

1-2. Authorizing, adopting and approving a cable franchise agreement between the Township and Comcast Cablevision of New Mexico/Pennsylvania, Inc. (Ord. 287, 8/26/2002)

III. BOND ISSUES AND LOANS

3-1. To authorize and direct the issuance of general obligation bonds of the Township of Spring, Berks County, Pennsylvania, in the maximum amount of \$120,000.00 for the purpose of providing funds for and toward the constructing, reconstructing and improving the public roads comprising the Township road system; providing for the rate of interest on said bonds and fixing the maturity dates thereof; stating the estimated period of usefulness of the property and improvements for which said bonds are to be issued; approving the form of bond and coupon, providing for the assessment, levy and collection of a tax to pay the interest covenanted to be paid thereon and the principal thereof at maturity directing the Secretary of the Township of Spring to certify and to file with the Department of Internal Affairs certified copies of the necessary proceeding. (Ordinance 34, June 10, 1957)

3-2. Adopting by-laws, a seal, and a project: approving agreement of acquisition; reporting same to Board of Township Supervisors; and, contingent upon the approval of the Township Supervisors, authorizing execution and delivery of agreement of acquisition, appointing trustee for bondholders, approving form of and authorizing execution and delivery of indenture of trust, of lease of project to Township, of \$50,000 Series A bonds, and of \$54,000 Series B bonds; approving and accepting offer of Grant & Co. to purchase Series A bonds, and of Berkshire Greens, Inc., to purchase Series B bonds; authorizing delivery of bonds to purchasers; approving and authorizing payment of purchase price under agreement of acquisition and payment of expenses of financing; authorizing investment of moneys; and authorizing settlement. (Resolution, January 28, 1959) (This related to the Sewer District #1 project.)

3-3. Directing the Secretary of this Township to advertise for sale general obligation serial bonds, in the aggregate principal amount of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000), which, together with general obligation term bonds, in the aggregate principal amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), to be authorized concurrently, will be to provide funds for and toward acquiring, constructing, erecting, equipping and furnishing a Town Hall for Township purposes and paying costs, fees and expenses related to the foregoing purposes and to the financing; specifying the time and place of opening and reading all bids for purchase of said general obligation serial bonds; specifying that all bids shall be addressed and shall be delivered to the Secretary of this Township; setting forth the manner in which the appropriate notice of sale shall be published; and setting forth the appropriate notice of sale. (Resolution 71-4, May 17, 1971)

3-4. Authorizing and directing issuance of general obligation serial bonds of the Township, in the maximum aggregate principal amount of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000), and of general obligation term bonds of this Township, in the maximum aggregate principal amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), to provide funds for and toward acquiring, constructing, erecting, equipping and furnishing a Town Hall for Township purposes and paying costs, fees and expenses related to the foregoing purposes and to the

financing; fixing the form, denominations numbers, date, maturity dates interest rate(s), interest payment dates, registration privileges, place of payment of principal and interest, redemption provisions and tax free provisions of said bonds; specifying the estimated period of useful life of the property to be acquired and of usefulness of improvements to be made, as appropriate in connection with which the increase of debt is to be incurred, for which purposes said bonds are to be issued; declaring said bonds to be general obligations of this Township and pledging the full faith, honor, credit and taxing power of this Township for payment of the principal of, interest on and taxes upon said bonds, authorizing execution of said bonds and authentication of coupons to be affixed thereunto; levying and assessing taxes for payment of debt service applicable to said bonds; establishing sinking funds and providing for application of money paid into said sinking funds; specifying the purposes for which proceeds of sale of said bonds shall be used; declaring said bonds to be within constitutional and statutory limitations imposed upon this Township, authorizing and directing certain officers to comply with certain provisions of the Act of June 24, 1941, P.L. 159, as amended and supplemented; appointing a paying agent and registrar or transfer agent with respect to said bonds; providing for severability of provisions; and repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances insofar as the same shall be inconsistent herewith. (Ordinance 89, June 17, 1971)

3-5. Accepting the bid of the highest responsible bidder for the purchase of general obligation serial bonds of this Township, in the aggregate principal amount of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000); directing the Secretary of the Township to notify the successful bidder of acceptance of the bid: directing the Secretary of this Township to deliver said general obligation serial bonds to the successful bidder following required approval of the authorized procedure and upon receipt of the purchase price: directing the Treasurer of this Township to hold the bid deposit of the successful bidder and to apply the same against the purchase price upon delivery of said general obligation serial bonds; and directing the Secretary of this Township to return the bid security of each uncessful bidder. (Resolution 71-5, June 17, 1971)

3-6. Authorizing the offering of general obligation term bonds, Series of 1971, in the aggregate principal amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000}, at private sale, without advertisement for competitive bids, as is permitted by law; setting forth the method and procedure of offering said general obligation term bonds at private sale and approving forms to be used in connection therewith; authorizing and directing appropriate advertising; designating certain bank(s) as agent(s) of this Township to perform functions and duties in connection with offering said general obligation term bonds at private sale; directing the Treasurer of this Township to hold good faith deposits received in connection with offering said general obligation term bonds for sale and to apply the same against the purchase price upon delivery of said general obligation term bonds; directing the Treasurer of the Township to deliver said general obligation term bonds to purchasers thereof following the required approval of the authorized procedure and upon receipt of the purchase price; and authorizing proper officers of this Township to do and perform all other acts and things necessary in connection with offering said general obligation term bonds for sale. (Resolution 71-6, June 17, 1971)

3-7. Authorizing and directing issuance of general obligation bonds of this Township, in the aggregate principal amount of one million six hundred seventy thousand dollars (\$1,670,000.00), pursuant to the Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, approved July 12, 1972, Act No. 185, as amended and supplemented, to provide funds for and toward capital projects which consist of: (1) planning, designing, acquiring, constructing and improving and enlarging certain sanitary sewage collection, transmission and disposal system facilities; (2) acquiring and constructing storm sewers and drains; and (3) purchasing, acquiring, making and constructing other capital improvements and/or capital equipment for proper municipal purposes; combining said projects for financing nonelectoral debt of this Township; setting forth a brief description of and a reasonable estimate of the useful life of such projects; accepting a certain bid or proposal for purchase of such bonds, at private sale, and awarding such bonds and setting forth related provisions; providing that such bonds, when issued, shall be general obligation bonds of this Township; fixing the substantial form, denomination, numbers, date, maturity dates, interest rates, interest payment dates, registration privileges, place of payment of principal and interest, redemption provisions and tax-free provisions of such bonds; authorizing execution of such bonds and authentication of coupons to be attached thereunto; providing covenants related to debt service applicable to such bonds as required by such Act and pledging the full faith and credit and taxing power of the Township in support thereof; creating a sinking fund (including a mandatory sinking fund depository; providing a covenant to insure prompt and full payment of all obligations of such bonds when due; authorizing and directing specified officers of this Township to do, to take and to perform certain specified required, necessary or appropriate acts and things; setting forth that such bonds have been sold at private sale; declaring the debt to be incurred, together with other indebtedness of the Township, not to be in excess of any applicable limitation imposed by such Act upon the incurring of debt by this Township; setting forth certain covenants relating to the non-arbitrage status of such bonds; providing when this ordinance shall become effective; providing for severability of provisions; and repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances insofar as the same shall be inconsistent herewith. (Ordinance 138, August 8, 1977)

3-8. Increasing the debt in the maximum amount of four million one hundred fifteen thousand (\$4,115,000.00) dollars for the purpose of sewer acquisition and construction of sewers. (Ordinance 203, June 26, 1989)

3-9. Authorizing and directing issuance of general obligation notes in the amount of four hundred and fifty thousand (\$450,000) dollars for the purpose of the improvements of storm sewer collection system. (Ordinance 213, November 27, 1989)

3-10. Incurring a debt in the maximum amount of four million four hundred fifty-five thousand dollars (\$4,455,000.00) as a lease rental debt. (Ordinance 227, 4/22/1993)

Authorizing the selection and appropriation of a certain 50-foot-wide permanent easement for municipal utility purposes including a permanent easement to widen and deepen an existing watercourse running through the Township of Spring, Berks County, Pennsylvania, between Whitfield, Section 5, and Cacoosing Creek; authorizing the filing of a declaration of taking and all necessary action for the acquisition thereof. (Resolution 73-12A, November 12, 1973)

Resolved, that the Township of Spring accept the Quit Claim Dedication of the land offered by Ferguson and Flynn Enterprises, Inc. shown on the Final Plan of Drexelwood Townhouses, recorded in PBV, P9 of Berks County Records at Reading, Pa., as a storm water retention basin together with such other compatible public use as the Township may, by appropriate resolution, hereafter designate. 6-9. Providing for the Acquisition by Eminent Domain for public recreational purposes, certain Real Estate of Lions Club of Whitefield, known as Breneman Memorial Park, located along Reedy's Road, Spring Township, Berks County, Pennsylvania. (Ordinance 191, October 13, 1986)

VII. SEWERS

1-1. Creating a sewer district within the Township of Spring, Berks County, to be called "Sewer District No. 1 of Spring Township," requiring owners of unproved property within the district to connect with the sewers forming a part of the sewer system within the said district to be operated by the Township or the Municipal Authority of the Township of Spring, as the case may be; regulating the manner in which connections shall be made. prescribing that, upon failure to make such connections, the Township may cause such connections to be made and collect the costs thereof from the owners in the manner prescribed by law, requiring the abandonment of all privies, cesspools, septic tanks, and similar receptacles for receiving sewage on such premises and also prohibiting any connection from any vault, privy, cesspool, septic tank, or similar receptacle for receiving sewage being made to the sewer system, and prescribing penalties for the violation of this ordinance. (Ordinance 38A, January 28, 1959) (Sewer District No. 1 is now part of Sewer District No. 3.)

7-2. Adopting by-laws, a seal, and a project; approving agreement of acquisitions; reporting same to Board of Township Supervisors; and, contingent upon the approval of the Township Supervisors, authorizing execution and delivery of agreement of acquisition, appointing trustee for bondholders, approving form of and authorizing execution and delivery of indenture of trust, of lease of project to Township, of \$50,000 Series A bonds, and of \$54,000 Series B bonds; approving and accepting offer of Grant & Co. to purchase Series A bonds, and of Berkshire Greens, Inc. to purchase Series B bonds; authorizing delivery of bonds to purchasers; approving and authorizing payment of purchase price under agreement of acquisition and payment of expenses of financing; authorizing investment of moneys; and authorizing settlement. (Resolution, January 28, 1959) (The project referred to is Sewer District No. 1.)

7-3. Authorizing and approving an agreement between Cumru Township Authority, Berks County, Pennsylvania, the Township of Cumru, Berks County, Pennsylvania, The Municipal Authority of the Township of Spring, Berks County, Pennsylvania, and the Township of Spring, Berks County, Pennsylvania, providing for the construction and joint use of a certain sewers for the collection and transportation of sewage; authorizing and directing execution, acknowledgment and delivery of said agreement in behalf of this Township; and authorizing and directing other necessary action. (Ordinance 46, July 5, 1962) (The specific location of the sewers was not stated.)

7-4. Authorizing and approving an agreement between Cumru Township Authority, Berks County, Pennsylvania, the Township of Cumru, Berks County, Pennsylvania, the Municipal Authority of the Township of Spring, Berks County, Pennsylvania, and the Township of Spring, Berks County, Pennsylvania, providing for the joint construction and joint use of certain sewers for the transportation of sewage; authorizing and directing execution,

acknowledgment and delivery of said agreement in behalf of this Township: and authorizing and directing other necessary action. (Ordinance 47, August 13, 1962) (The specific location of the sewers was not stated.)

7.5. Specifying an additional project to be undertaken by the Municipal Authority of the Township of Spring, Berks County, which additional project shall consist of acquisition and construction of a sewage collection and transportation system, including all necessary, related and appurtenant facilities, in, through, for and adjacent to a certain area or portion of this Township; specifying and describing the area or portion of this Township within which such additional project shall be undertaken; requesting said Municipal Authority of the Township of Spring, Berks County, to undertake such additional project and the financing thereof; reserving the right to enlarge or diminish said area or portion of this Township within which such additional project shall be undertaken; and repealing all ordinances and/or resolutions or parts of ordinances and/or resolutions inconsistent herewith. (Ordinance 49, February 23, 1963) (This refers to Sewer District No. 3, which now also includes Sewer District No. 1. Sewer District No. 3 more specifically includes the developments of West Wyomissing, Cornwall Terrace, Lincoln Park, Springmont, Midvale Manor, and Montrose Manor, all of the aforesaid being part of the Wyomissing Creek Drainage Area.)

7-6. Approving plans and specifications for construction of sewer facilities, in, through, for and adjacent to a certain area or portion of the Township of Spring, Berks County, Pennsylvania, as submitted by the Municipal Authority of The Township of Spring, Berks County, such construction to be undertaken by said Authority; approving the report of the consulting engineers relating to such construction and the financing thereof, as submitted by said Authority; approving the estimated cost of such sewer facilities; and approving the estimated cost of assessable sewers and the proposed charge of part of such cost of assessable sewers, against properties benefited, improved or accommodated thereby, by assessment according to the foot front rule. (Ordinance 51, June 24, 1963) (This refers to Sewer District No. 3 as described in Section 7-5, above.)

7-7. Authorizing and approving an agreement of lease, dated as of August 1, 1963, between the Municipal Authority of the Township of Spring, Berks County, as lessor, and the Township of Spring, Berks County, Pennsylvania, as leesee, under terms of which certain sewer facilities to be constructed and owned by said Authority will be leased to this Township for operation and use; authorizing and directing execution, acknowledgment and delivery of said agreement of lease in behalf of this Township; appointing consulting engineers and a certified public accountant; and authorizing and directing other necessary and proper action. (Ordinance 54, August 1, 1963) (The specific location of the sewers was not stated.)

7-8. Specifying an additional project to be undertaken by the Municipal Authority of the Township of Spring, Berks County, which additional project shall consist of acquisition and construction of a sewage collection, transportation and treatment system, including the acquisition and construction of

all necessary, related and appurtenant facilities, in, through and for a certain area or portion of this Township; specifying and describing the area or portion of this Township within which such additional project shall be undertaken; requesting said Municipal Authority of the Township of Spring, Berks County, to undertake such additional project and the financing thereof; reserving the right to enlarge or diminish said area or portion of this Township within which such additional project shall be undertaken; and repealing all ordinances and/or resolutions or parts of ordinances and/or resolutions inconsistent herewith. (Ordinance 59, September 13, 1965) (This refers to Sewer District No. 4, which more specifically includes the developments of Whitfield, Colony Park, Wilshire, Drexel Wood, and portions of the Cacoosing Creek drainage area. See also Section 7-9, below.)
